Over the last 50 years, our family has learned a lot about milking cows and dairy delivery. Some things have remained the same through the years; for example, the importance of keeping our cows comfortable. A happy and comfortable cow is a productive cow. They require a balanced diet, a lot of water and a peaceful, low stress environment so that they are able to rest.

On the other hand, we have seen many changes during this time. Most notably, we have gained efficiencies throughout the milking process. Twenty-five years ago, we could milk twelve cows at a time and now we milk twice as many. The production per cow has gone up by 50 percent, thanks to better nutrition, breeding, cow care, and procedures like milking three times per day rather than two times. Nutritional science has also become much more developed, which means the cows are able to get more protein and energy in their diet.

Dear Friends,

When we were kids, we had a very traditional neighbor who taught her kids to bring us a May basket, on May 1st, with butterscotch candies in it. They would knock on the door, then run and hide so we'd see the beautiful May basket – then wonder who brought it.

Home delivery of milk in glass bottles has a couple of similarities. The package is put together with careful thought and planning. It is a specific delivery for each specific household. But, the milk delivery person doesn't knock on the door and hide (that might be kind of creepy). He quietly delivers to many homes, a little like Santa.

How do they do it, week in and week out? Never a question, never a doubt. My order shows up at my house without fail, And they take care of every detail.



Kentucky Derby Butter Cake

May 2nd marks the 141st annual Kentucky Derby. Many traditions surround the annual horse race, from extravagant women's hats to delicious dishes. This moist, creamy Bundt cake is a traditional Derby recipe that you will love.

Cake batter ingredients

3 cups flour 1 cup buttermilk 2 cups sugar 1 cup butter

1 tsp. salt 2 tsp. vanilla extract

1 tsp. baking powder 4 eggs

½ tsp. baking soda

Sauce ingredients

CONCENTRATE

34 cup sugar 2 tsp. vanilla extract 45 cup butter 3 Tbsp. water

In a large bowl cream 1 cup butter and 2 cups sugar using a hand mixer. Mix in

buttermilk, 2 tsp. vanilla extract and eggs. Using a hand mixer,

combine flour, salt, baking powder and baking soda and beat on medium speed for 3 minutes. Pour batter into greased and floured 10 inch Bundt cake pan and bake in the oven at 325° for 1 hour, or until no batter sticks when inserting a wooden toothpick into center of cake.

While cake batter is baking, prepare the butter sauce in a saucepan. Combine ¾ cups sugar, ⅓ cup butter, 2 tsp. vanilla, and water and cook over medium heat until sauce is melted. Do not boil. Prick holes into still warm cake then slowly pour sauce over entire top of cake. Allow to cool before removing from pan. *Makes 12 servings*.
